In 1347 six BURGHERS OF CALAIS offered their lives to save their city from destruction by Edward III during the Hundred Year's War.

In 1981 the VIRGINIA FOUNDATION FOR THE HUMANITIES AND PUBLIC POLICY sponsored an interpretive film based on Auguste Rodin's sculpture dramatizing the Burghers' sacrifice for the public good. The film is being shown throughout Virginia and the nation to stimulate reflection on the relationship of individual freedom, rights, and responsibilities to community needs and responsibilities. Scholars in the humanities lead discussions relating the historic event to contemporary issues.
